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LEGACY SCHOLAR STUDENTS TAKE D.C. BY STORM!

During their Spring Break, six of our high school students had the opportunity to visit Washington, D.C. Not only was this the first time that these children had been to our nation's capitol, for some it was the first time they had been on a plane.

Their first day took them to the Smithsonian and included the American History Museum, Natural History Museum, and the Air and Space Museum. That was followed by the Arlington National Cemetery and the Iwo Jima Memorial. One of the high points was meeting with Congressman John Mica. He treated them to pizza and took them to the floor of the House to observe a vote. The students even presented him with a copy of Under the Sheltering Tree, A Brief History of the Florida United Methodist Children's Home, a history of our first one hundred years.

The week continued with visits to Ford's Theater, the Spy Museum, Library of Congress, and of course, the White House visitor center. They even enjoyed some night-time activity with a ghost tour, learning just how "haunted" the capitol is thought to be. The experience was truly a once-in-a-lifetime trip for these children, and it's one that they will never forget. It's also the kind of educational experience that is only possible through your generous support of the Children's Home.

The children's trip was sponsored through the legacy of Lois B. Jamieson. Interestingly, Lois lived in the D.C. area and volunteered at the Smithsonian Institute where she enjoyed showing artifacts to the visiting children. This trip, and much of what is done for the children, would not be possible without friends like Mrs. Jamieson.

Education at the children's home

At the Florida United Methodist Children's Home, we recognize the importance of education in the long term success our children. Our programs are designed to satisfy the educational needs our children through all grade levels and into college. In addition to our residents, our preschool program serves those five years of age or less in the community.

IN AS MUCH

Located on our main campus in Enterprise, our Montessori based preschool serves children up to six years of age in three different programs.

- **INFANT PROGRAM.** The goals of our infant classroom are to help the children to develop a strong sense of trust and independence. Materials are meticulously chosen and displayed on low open shelves to bring out an infant's natural curiosity.
- **TODDLER PROGRAM.** Our toddler program's focus is to aid the child in developing independence and self-management, while meeting their basic needs of trust and separation. In the Montessori environment, the children develop a strong sense of self-esteem and security.
- PRESCHOOL & VPK PROGRAMS. The preschool environment is intended to be a catalyst for the child's own natural desire to learn. We encourage the children to experience choices and guide the child to do things for themselves and build their independence. This program is geared to children between the ages of three and six, with classrooms sized and geared to their pace and interests. Classrooms are organized into several curriculum areas, including: language, mathematics, geography, science, social studies, art, music, living skills, sensory awareness and movement.

ALDERSGATE ACADEMY

As part of our residential program here at the Children's Home, we serve children who need short term emergency shelter due to traumatic disruptions in their previous living situations. In order to meet their education needs, we began a State of Florida registered private school on our Enterprise campus called, Aldersgate Academy. Due to the short term duration of emergency shelter placements, our school's primary focus is to create a stabilized learning environment, while supporting continuity in academic instruction.

LEGACY SCHOLARS ACADEMY

Residents on both campuses range from five to seventeen years of age. Many of the children at our Enterprise campus attend local public schools in Volusia county, while the children at our Madison Youth Ranch attend the local public schools in Madison county. Legacy Scholars Academy was created on our Enterprise campus to provide the educational needs of our children who would be better served by the extra attention that our staff can give them.

The Legacy Scholars Academy was created in partnership with the Volusia County School district and provides education for residents in grades K-12. The classroom ratio remains low with eight students to each teacher and paraprofessionals, allowing us to give children the attention and direction they need for academic success. This partnership gives the Children's Home access to a broad range of resources including academic specialists, Volusia Virtual School, dual enrollment, and the ability to attain a high school diploma.

An education at Legacy Scholars Academy focuses on the skills that students need to compete and be professionally successful. STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) is an important part of today's job market, and is part of our curriculum. Education partners like Bethune-Cookman University, Mentis Science, Inc. and Raytheon have provided equipment and support, allowing us to expand our children's knowledge in STEM related areas.

Our children don't stop learning when they leave the classroom. Through the generous support of our friends, we were able to send some of our students to Washington, D.C. during spring break. In addition to touring the sites, they were able to spend some one-on-one time with Congressman John Mica, who even took the children to the House floor to observe a legislative vote.

- High School prior to coming to the Children's Home, had five disciplinary referrals and was behind in his math and reading. Now that he is here at the Children's Home, he has had zero referrals at our Legacy Scholars Academy and recently tested enough to allow him to begin college level math.
- Arnold, who also is in tenth grade, came to our at Legacy, he is back to grade level with test scores
- Lily, a fifth grader, had eight referrals last year at Forest Lake Elementary, but has really turned reading in math, and has already caught up to her

A CONVERSATION WITH HOWARD & MARILYN WITT

Howard and Marilyn Witt are friends of the Florida United Methodist Children's Home. We recently spoke with them during a visit to the Children's Home. They shared their passion for the Home and why they are so involved.

Our connection to the Florida United Methodist Children's Home is related to the death of our young daughter, Kristin, as well as the adoption of our two daughters, Laura and Ashley. Several years after her adoption, we learned that Laura had been sexually abused as a very young child. Each of these life events led to our desire to help make the world a better place for all children.

We first became acquainted with the Home during annual visits to our church from the President of the Home. We became really connected a few years ago during a Children's Home sermon at the Boca Grande Lighthouse Church by the new President Becky Dotson, especially when she mentioned the adoption of her own son, Ryan. Soon after we visited the Home for the first time at the Day on Campus event and were motivated not only by Becky, but by the passionate and dedicated staff. This is what drew us and others from Boca Grande Lighthouse Church to buy in and make major commitments. In fact, we personally joined forces with another couple who was also moved by Becky's sermon to provide the seed money to start the Legacy Scholars Academy on the Enterprise campus. Soon after a third couple from our church joined in and matched our gift.

In this way, we are making a positive impact in the lives of the children living there who have been abused and not given the advantages in life that our children have been given. We are proud to give back in a small way for our many blessings.

The greatest impact the Home provides is by giving abused and neglected children a safe, secure and loving home resulting in a new lease on life. Legacy Scholars Academy is a very important part of this ministry because of its emphasis on social emotional learning (an initiative we are familiar with at other organizations we support) which enables the children to succeed in their academic studies.
