## Children's Home Students Finish School Year Strong!

As our nation implemented safeguards to fight the spread of COVID-19, the needs of everyday life continued to press on all of us. This was especially evident in the field of education, where countless teachers and administrators grappled with the need for continued quality teaching in a time where we can't gather together. Here at the Florida United Methodist Children's Home, we are proud to say that our students finished out the 2019-2020 school year strong. In response to the pandemic, our elementary school-aged children, along with our other children who attend off-campus schools, shifted to a completely online-based program. This was also true of our children at the Madison Youth Ranch. For our Legacy Scholars Academy (LSA) students, they were given work packets and specific times to work with our on-campus staff to complete their assignments.

In addition to students completing the school year requirements, the Children's Home is very proud that we have five students who have finished their high school studies and are set to graduate. Of these five, three are currently studying at Daytona State College and the other two are in our Independent Living Program. We will be having a virtual graduation ceremony on July 16, where a very limited number of students and staff will gather in our gym. We will share more about this in an upcoming Link. Trevis Bright, our Director of Education, spoke about the tension of graduation in a pandemic. "I wish we could have had a traditional ceremony, so that the children's families could have been here to celebrate in person," he said. "However, this will give them an opportunity to see the students and celebrate with them, even from a distance."

Bright said that the students and staff have done an incredible job in adapting to the new realities around them. "We have all learned the importance of flexibility from this situation," he said. "While we plan and prepare ahead of time, times like these remind us that not everything is set in stone." We are hoping to move forward with on-campus school in the fall, depending on the guidance we receive from Volusia County Public Schools. In the meantime, we want to thank everyone who continues to hold our children and staff in your prayers, and we hope to be able to see you all soon!

## Foster Care Celebrates In May And June

Foster Care Services is a vital part of the ministry of the Florida United Methodist Children's Home. With offices in four counties, and the recently secured contract to provide therapeutic foster care in Hillsborough County, our Foster Care Services program helps ensure the Children's Home is reaching more children. May and June were designated as Foster Parent Appreciation Month and National Reunification Month, respectively, and we are incredibly proud to be a part of this important ministry to the community.

This May, through personalized efforts, we were still able to lift up the vital work of our foster families. While Foster Parent Appreciation Month celebrates the ways that foster parents support children and families, National Reunification Month is an opportunity to rejoice with families who "have overcome obstacles to providing their child a safe and nurturing home environment and are able to successfully reunify after their child was placed in the state child welfare system," (Florida Coalition for Children press release). Having a focus both on foster parents and reunification celebrates the necessary work of foster care in repairing family structures.

"There are a lot of pieces to the child welfare puzzle," said Cedric Davis, Director of Foster Care at the Children's Home. "Without foster parents, we would be missing a huge piece of this puzzle." Currently, the Children's Home has 66 licensed foster families serving in four counties across the state. Additionally, we were recently awarded a contract to provide therapeutic foster services in Hillsborough County, which will allow us to serve foster children in need of a higher level of care. Davis named three things that he expects from our foster families, which are: safety, permanency, and well-being. "This is what we're trying to accomplish in the lives of our children," said Davis, "and our foster families do these three things incredibly well."

The Foster Care program allows the Children's Home to serve more children in more places, also enabling us to support other communities by keeping their children safe.
