The 2021 performance featured a grumpy Grinch, his sidekick Max, Cindy Lou Who, three wonderful narrators, and a whole cast of characters!

The drama ministry has been led by Betty Cesar, Program Coordinator with the Spiritual Life team here at the Children's Home. While contemplating what production to put on for this year's performance, the Spiritual Life team came across "How the Grinch Stole Christmas." Cesar said that the story of the Grinch, "speaks of how one person's heart can change and grow, and we thought it would be a powerful story for the children to put on display." Additionally, most of the children were very familiar with the story, so they were quite excited to put on this performance.

There were two showings of the performance: one for the Board of Trustees at their quarterly meeting, and then one for the whole campus. Cesar said that it was great for the youth to perform for their peers, many of whom hadn't seen them act before. The young lady cast in the role of Cindy Lou Who, for example, had never sung publicly. During the rehearsal phase of the show, she almost quit due to the solo her character was expected to sing. Cesar said that, despite the fact that this child was very timid, her peers were very encouraging. During the performances, she sang the solo, and was very proud of herself for showing the courage to do something she hadn't done before. Both the Board of Trustees and all of the campus who attended were impressed with the work that the children put in, and the story of the Grinch's transformation was a beautiful image of the work of God.
